.A Note from Tom

In my Tuesday night Christian fellowship group (we meet on Zoom), we were re-

cently discussing the conversion of St. Paul. I made a comment to the group about our own individual conversions. Then my friend Jim said, "The conversions [we experience] are ongoing. Our faith ebbs and flows all the time. We are in a constant state of conversion."

This, I thought, is definitely true. There have been times in my life when my enthusiasm for God has been high, and there have been times when I couldn't have possibly cared less. Times when I prayed, and times when I ignored God altogether. Times when I attended church obsessively, and times when church members forgot my name. Times when I read every religious book I could get my hands on, and times when I threw them away.

It pains me to think of the things I missed out on because of my religious apathy. Not only church experiences ("Oh, today is Graduation Sunday?"), but my personal relationship with God. A life lived without God is a life that misses out on God's love

and support. And the only way a person loses God's love is when they choose to not accept it. When I am with God I am healthier, happier, more thoughtful, and less selfish. But if God is not part of my life I am....alone.

And like St. Paul, when I am away from God I am blind. I do not (and did not) see what I was missing. I remember once when I bought a small house. It was a foreclosure that was in rough shape. I was going to fix it up and rent it for extra income. I became so obsessed with fixing up the house that I skipped church for about two months straight. I had to get the house ready to rent so that I could recoup the money I had invested. As I reflect on this period of my life, I realize that it was not the money I was missing out on. It was God. My life was never enriched by a house. It was enriched by God's love.

I think my friend Jim was spot-on when he said that we are in a constant state of conversion. And therefore, I can think of no better prayer than to ask God to remove the scales from our eyes so that we may fully see our own relationship with God. And when we see God, we can answer like Ananias, "Here I am, Lord."

Calico Beans

With Memorial Day approaching it seems like a good time to bring back one of the old picnic favorites with lots of updates!

Brown:


- 1/2 lb bacon (or 1 jar Hormel dried bacon no need to brown this product as it is fully cooked))
- 1 lb ground beef (**or 1lb chorizo sausage** for more spice)
- 1 cup chopped onion

Combine in slow cooker with:

- 1/2 c brown sugar
- 1T dry mustard
- 2 cans of any type of pork and beans (Or substitute Bush's bourbon & brown sugar beans and skip the brown sugar and mustard!)
- 2 more cans of beans just mix the colors! (butter beans, cannellini, kidney, lima, black)
- 1/2c ketchup
- 1t salt
- 1T vinegar

Cook on low 3-5 hours. Good hot or room temp. Party on!



Lent Madness is a tongue-in-cheek contest that mimics basketball's Sweet Sixteen spring series. Here the contestants are saints drawn from the broad history and scope of our Christian history. This year's finalists were St. Teresa of Avila and St. Jose Hernandez. The results were a surprise to many....

In a year marked by razor-thin margins of victory, the championship round between Teresa of Avila and José Gregorio Hernández did not disappoint! In the end, José snuck past Teresa in a photo finish to win the 2022 Golden Halo. Both of these saints captured the imaginations of the Lent Madness global voting public and both are worthy of this ecclesiastical accolade. We are pleased to award Teresa the (rare) Silver Halo to mark this year's accomplishments.

Rest assured the result, while exceedingly close, is accurate. The Supreme Executive Committee spent the morning in the mezzanine-level review booth conducting a forensic analysis of the voting. There was some cheating involved on both sides and we eliminated those votes (come ON, people!).

José joins previous Golden Halo winners George Herbert (2010), C.S. Lewis (2011), Mary Magdalene (2012), Frances Perkins (2013), Charles Wesley (2014), Francis of Assisi (2015), Dietrich Bonhoeffer (2016), Florence Nightingale (2017), Anna Alexander (2018), Martha of Bethany (2019), Harriet Tubman (2020), and Absalom Jones (2021).

Here's what the reviewer wrote about Dr. Hernandez and what drew his supporters.... I had never heard of Dr. José Gregorio Hernández before the Lent Madness Assignments hit my inbox. Naturally, I was curious...what would the big famous story be?

I looked for milestone moments: what I discovered instead was humble, everyday holiness. Day in and day out, healing, teaching, and serving; José Hernández was a man for others. There was no one famous story, it turned out; but one million—one million quiet miracles of illnesses healed or debts paid, the kind of miracles that are famous in one house, not to history. José was dedicated to his work, but it cost him other dreams. As a young man, and really throughout his life, he dreamed of becoming a priest. But that would mean turning his back on the rare education and opportunities he had been blessed with. In his heart, he knew his community needed a doctor more than they needed another priest.

El santo medico refused wealth and status, he said no to easier jobs because he wanted to serve the poor. He didn't spurn money as much as he truly understood its power, how people struggled to live with dignity. He saw how all too often, it was poverty that was the death sentence, not the diagnosis.

When people called him a miracle-worker, José insisted that it was God's grace. His strong faith helped people to know God, and to believe that God cared about them. I keep thinking about his funeral—the crowds filling the streets to follow his coffin, chanting "Dr. Hernández is ours!" It can be tricky to be a Latina blogger writing about a Latino saint. You want to do right by their story, clarifying traditions that have often been dismissed or misunderstood, while not be-

ing misunderstood yourself. It felt important to acknowledge other religious traditions also recognize José's holiness—not to say these religions are right, or equivalent, but for what this can teach us about the power of our own Christian witness to change people's lives.

I know some readers found this narrative choice distasteful, but it helped me understand myself. Santería and María Lionza would not exist if not for colonialism and the brutality of the slave trade—and neither would the vital witness of Latin American Christianity. For José to be a devout Catholic Venezuelan, for me to come from faithful Puerto Rican Christians, is to know that freedom in Christ has become ours through a terrible history of violence. To be a Latin American Christian is to live a complex faith—knowing injustice and evil brought Christianity to your people, but still trusting in Jesus. In Him, even the hard wood of the cross became a tree of life.

José lived the complexity with eyes wide open. He spent day after day with the sick and the dying, saw the randomness of poverty and suffering, and still got up each morning praising God. José Gregorio Hernández should win the Golden Halo because his life should inspire every single one of us to use the gifts that we have been given, to walk in love as Christ loved us, and gave himself for us. Our lives truly can be an offering to God and to the world.

Greetings beloved friends,

We are gathering for Easter in the midst of so much loss. Two years of this pandemic has drained so much of our energy, individually and collectively. Globally, we have lost more than six million people. We are living in the midst of many wars including the war in Ukraine, where violence is seeming to have the last and sometimes the only word.

In the midst of so much that is broken in our human community we are reminded of this incredible story of resurrection where women, Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary, and other women, went to a tomb to care for a body. A dead body. Jesus' body. They ended up awakening


to a new world view that was not familiar to them. It is not familiar to us.


That is the real story of Easter, where God breaks through and gives us a new way to be. Providence is what we associate with the gift of God. When God invites us to a new way of being, that is providence. Jesus died and was raised from the dead: providence.

The joy of knowing God is with us in a very real way. Not as a baby that is vulnerable anymore, but as the risen Christ giving us the strength to face our fears, our challenges, and overcome everything that stymies us, and release us to this grace of joy.

So, my beloved friends, as you gather for your celebration of Easter this year, I pray that you will be filled with the reassurance of providence, a deep assurance of the courage that we have as followers of Jesus, and live into your joy abundantly.

In order to provide parishioners with better financial information, data regarding the most recent month's financials will be provided along with the January year-to-date (YTD) data. As of March's month end, our results were:

Income for March continues to be above expectations. Lower expenses for the month resulted in a Net Income that was substantially over budget. Even considering \$1,250 set aside for future costs of maintaining Rev. Manny after the Diocese support ceases, this Net Income was very good.

Year-to-Date Income is also above Budget. We are most thankful to all our Parishioners who are supporting the church. And Year-to-Date Net Income, also above expectations, helps us move more toward our objective of having sufficient funds to cover the costs of Rev. Tom Manney on a

part time basis after the Diocese support finishes mid next year.

It is not unusual for first quarter numbers to vary to the budget by wide margins. In future months, these numbers will smooth out. The church's financial situation continues strong. We are moving in the planned direction. Thank you all for your support and prayers.

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
