Dear people of St. John's,

The end of June and the start of July; does it feel excessively warm to you? Have you ever been confronted with winds which seem to blow branches from the trees immediately after you have retrieved the branches from the previous heavy wind? Does grass appear to be growing faster and in need of mowing more often because we have had more rain? If you are experiencing these things, you are not alone. Is it climate change?

We have been moving nicely into the season of Pentecost; only about 17 more Sunday's to go. As we travel through this season we will hear many stories about Jesus and his disciples. Christianity is a missionary religion, infused with the commission to spread the word of repentance and healing everywhere. Jesus sent his disciples out two by two to spread the word which is an image which is characteristic of the church.

Jesus clearly calls his disciples to tell the story with words as well as actions. Many of us would not know where to start if someone would ask us to share our faith. This should not always be the case. If you need a prompt, think about the Nicene Creed. What do you believe about God? Jesus? The Holy Spirit? The church? Forgiveness? Resurrection?

We will also hear



about the beheading of John the Baptist which should paint an image of this cruel and unjust world. John's voice has survived for centuries and we continue to hear his preaching. John preached the truth and was arrested for his truth telling. There are many times in our lives when standing up for the truth and speaking up for the rights of others and calling for justice seem too risky. However, the implications of our baptism, call for us to do just that.

The story of John's death is not a pleasant story. It is violent and ugly. It serves a painful reminder not all stories have a happy ending. Sometimes the movies we watch, the books we read, the news we hear and the stories we live do not offer a fairy-tale ending. It is important to live within this reality. It is also important to remember the stories we encounter are often incomplete. *Continued on pg* 2


We invited Freya Gilbert to preach at St. John's during our June 23rd service. As a member of the LGBTQ+ community, she had agreed to answer questions during

our coffee





From the General Convention of the Episcopal Church 2024 -

Sean Rowe elected 28th presiding bishop

The Rt. Rev. Sean Rowe, bishop of Northwest Pennsylvania and bishop provisional of Western New York, was elected June 26 by the House of Bishops to serve as the 28th presiding bishop, and his election was confirmed by the House of Deputies at the 81st General Convention.

Rowe's election was announced by House of Deputies President Julia Ayala Harris on the house's afternoon session, and the deputies proceeded to confirm him with a nearly unanimous majority, 95% in favor. After the confirmation vote, all

rose in applause.

Rowe will begin his nine-year term as the public face and voice of The Episcopal Church and its chief pastor on Nov. 1, succeeding Presiding Bishop Michael Curry.

The House of Bishops met in a closed session at Christ Church Cathedral in downtown Louisville for the election. Rowe was elected by bishops on the first ballot, a result that was announced publicly in the House of Deputies and greeted by cheers from the standing-room-only crowd on the floor of the convention hall at the Kentucky International Convention Center.

Rowe was elected from a slate of five nominees chosen through a process led by the <u>Joint Nominating</u> <u>Committee for the Election of the Presiding Bishop</u>, which is made up of 20 bishops, clergy and lay leaders – 15 elected by General Convention and five appointed by the church's presiding officers.

Rowe, 49, has <u>led the Erie-based Diocese of Northwestern Pennsylvania since 2007</u>, and he also serves as bishop provisional of the Diocese of Western New York through a partnership the dioceses established in 2019. He previously served as bishop provisional of the Diocese of Bethlehem from 2014 to 2018.

He becomes the youngest bishop ever elected to serve as the church's presiding bishop.

May is the last month available for Vestry review.

Income:

Once adjusted for the amount of the annual donation made earlier this year, this is \$970 lower than budget.

Expenses:

Several accounts over budget this month were due to large, occasional activity. Generally, the inactive months balance this out.

Accounts such as: Music Events, Altar Guild,.

Two new accounts were added this month: Clergy Mileage (to reimburse Fr. Harold for pastoral visit trips), and Clergy Professional Development (to cover retreats and classes) Monthly budget for both is modest and does not pose a problem for the yearly budget.

YTD Income: Due to early donations, this will look great for guite a while

YTD Expenses: We are over by a modest number but many of the over budget accounts are leveling out should help. This month's number is better than last month's by \$1,000.

Net Profit: Looks wonderful! Even backing out the annual payment, we are still well in the black.

Restricted Funds:

We set aside \$487 from the recent concert to cover advertising expenses. Some payments have already been made.

Outreach Teen Relief received \$514 from our recent fund raisers.We had already recorded the Oxford Bank CD of \$10,000 for the Paint Project. The interest from that CD which matured in May has been added to the fund. We also received a \$10,000 donation which brings the Paint Project funds up to \$20,348.96 with an additional \$10,000 plus interest available in August when the next CD matures.

Vestry voted to use the \$89 from the recent Coffee Hour raffle to help offset Clergy Professional Development costs.

Vanguard Funds:

- Total Stock Fund Balance as of 05/31/2024 - \$78.806 - Almost \$14.000 increase above our initial investment of \$65,000
- CD of \$22,000 Matures 02/28/2025 at 5.41% interest

CD at Oxford Bank –\$10,000 CD at 5.65% maturing in August 2024

The other \$10,000 CD matured in Mav with interest of \$348.96. This has been added to the Restricted Account for the Paint Project. 6
