Connie Jones - We Were Blessed to Know Her

Kitty Underwood's mom, Connie Jones, passed away this month. Although she had been in decline for a while, it is always hard to lose someone special. A memorial service will be held at St. John's on Saturday, August 31st at 1PM. If you can come, I know the family would appreciate your support. An excerpt from the obituary follows. Did you know she had been such a traveler? Or that Kitty was a Buckeye?

Connie (Nank) (Reebel) Morehead Jones, 91 of Almont, passed away Saturday August 17, 2024. Connie was born on August 12, 1933 in Cleveland Ohio to Harold and Pauline Nank. She graduated from Cleveland Heights High School in 1951. Connie then attended Ohio Wesleyan Uni-



versity, where she joined Kappa Alpha Theta sorority. She met her future husband Walter Reebel while in college. Connie graduated Cum Laude with a BA in Elementary Education in 1955. Walter and Connie married shortly after graduation. They moved to Columbus, OH, where Walter attended law school at Ohio State University. Their daughter Kitty was born in 1957. Following Walter's graduation, they moved to back to Cleveland where in 1959, their son John was born. In 1963, the family moved to Bloomfield Hills, Michigan. Connie took a teaching position at Brookside School, Cranbrook. Walter and Connie divorced in 1973. Connie went on to earn a Master's Degree in Elementary Education at Oakland University. She married W. Allen Moorhead in 1978 and moved to New Cannan Connecticut. Connie and Al moved to several different homes during their marriage, eventually retiring in Savannah, GA. Connie and Al loved to travel, and visited every continent except Antarctica. Connie was widowed in 1998 and a year later married Edward Jones. Connie and Ed enjoyed their years together traveling, entertaining and spending time with their families. A few years after Ed's death in 2012, Connie moved to a senior facility in Hilton Head South Carolina. Connie returned to Michigan in 2020 to be nearer her children.

Connie passed away peacefully in her sleep August 17, 2024, in her home at The Bells in Almont, Michigan.

News from the Diocese - Planning for a new Era

Neil Hargrave has been our ear to the ground regarding discussions at the Diocesan level in preparation for the formal merging of Eastern & Western Dioceses. There's a lot of information and many decisions that need to be considered before the first joint Diocesan Convention in mid-October. Recently Neil shared copies of meeting minutes for Budget Planning and the Transition Leadership Team. These reports are available in their entirety to anyone who requests it. However, I've highlighted some areas that I think you might find interesting. Keep in mind, these are ongoing discussions. New ideas and decisions may very well occur between now and October. But this seems to be what they're considering.

Draft Budget Committee Items

Income:

A commitment that all parish assessments in 2025 will be frozen at their 2024 level.

Funding for Diocesan budget consists of "apportionment" funding from tithes and from "endowment" funding from bequests in both Eastern and Western dioceses. For 2025, "there is larger apportionment finding in Western Michigan and larger endowment funding from Eastern. However, put together, we see a healthy and shared income stream for ministry in the future Episcopal Diocese of the Great Lakes."

Expense:

Funds for an assisting bishop sufficient to call a full-time bishop are allocated. There is consideration of increasing it to include housing assistance to encourage an on-site bishop rather than a "Zoom" bishop.

Some new positions have been proposed

An Interim Chief of Staff to assist with coordinating management of the merged diocese and facilitate decision making if bishop is not available.

Director of Lifelong Learning & Formation to oversee the Academy and other formation needs for clergy and laity.

Database & Office Support which is an expansion of a prior position focused on the Dismantling Racism & Special Projects

The addition of these new positions is not funded at the moment. Recommendations are being considered that include deleting or adjusting some or all of these positions to maintain a balanced budget.

The annual Convention is subsidized by the Diocese at roughly 50% and costs are increasing. The Budget Committee recommended against increasing costs to individual parishes as current costs are a stretch for small parishes.

While the Diocese has previously covered the copyright licensing service One License for all congregations, the recommendation is to discontinue this and let parishes pursue their own licensing agreements.

Transition Leadership Team

Branding Team - New brand logo to include lighthouse imagery, a Latin translation of our motto and various colors

<u>Constitution and Cannons</u> – Two late August feedback sessions will be held to review the draft of the new documents. They are on track to submit a resolution to the convention by the Sept. 18th deadline.

<u>Convention Planning</u> – Location was inspected. Draft workshop lineup and schedule were reviewed. Working with the Liturgy Team to plan worship. *Continued on page 6...* 5

...continued from page 5. Joint Finance Committee - Draft Transition Budget to be sent to the Joint Councils for each Diocese for their review on August 17th. Hoping to make a final presentation on Sept. 21st. Continued on page 6

<u>Ministry of the Episcopate</u> – In early stages of discussions about calling a full time bishop to the new Diocese of the Great Lakes. Expressed some concern about one person trying to visit each parish within a 3 year timeframe as is currently required by the cannons. Currently considering ways the connection could be made without scheduling problems while being practical for the bishop too.

<u>Personnel Committee</u> – reviewing Policies & Procedures for coordinating past practices and possible new requirements.

Regional Design – The committee is gathering information on how regions are working and what needs are not being met.



Funding for the Painting Project is STRONG Thanks to YOU

We started the year with \$10,000 in Restricted Funds and a \$10,000 CD allocated for this

project. The approved bid came in at \$43,000+. So we had \$23,000 to cover. That seemed like a big step for our church to take. But thanks to your support and the Lord's help (through the Diocese), we're going to make it! Not only have our members contributed in large and small amounts, but Neil says the Diocese has approved our grant application which adds \$5,000 to the tally. We will need to use some of our General Fund to cover roughly \$12,000



but we have room in that

account to cover this without creating financial stress. That is because each of us has been contributing monthly to maintain a strong financial base. Thanks to Jack Dodd for managing this project so well. And thanks to all of you. We can all be proud of the result!


